Instruction: Get the Biggest Bang for your Buck!

Many teachers have been talking about John Hattie's book, *Visible Learning for Teachers.* The main ideas of Hattie's book are:

- Know your impact! Expert teachers focus on evaluating the effects certain instructional strategies have on students, and adjust their teaching methods accordingly.
- When teaching and learning are "visible" that is, when it is clear what teachers are teaching and what students are learning, student achievement increases.

Hattie synthesized over 50,000 studies related to achievement in students, and conducted the largest evidence-based research project in education. Hattie explains there are practices we know are effective and practices we know are not. *Visible Learning* outlines the factors that have the greatest impact on student learning. The findings in Hattie's book are useful because he provides information teachers can immediately put into practice.



Vocabulary Instruction

An effective strategy for teaching vocabulary is what Marzano refers to as *the six-step process* (Marzano, 2004). It involves the following steps:

- 1. Provide a description, explanation, or example of the new term.
- 2. Ask students to restate the description, explanation, or example in their own words.
- 3. Ask students to construct a picture, pictograph, or symbolic representation of the term.
- 4. Engage students periodically in activities that help them add to their knowledge of the terms in their vocabulary notebooks.
- 5. Periodically ask students to discuss the terms with one another.
- 6. Involve students periodically in games that enable them to play with terms.

Some big ideas from the article include:

- When students copy the teacher's explanation or description of a word instead of generating their own explanation, the results are not as strong. Ideally, student explanations should come from their own lives.
- The third step in the process is essential —having students represent their understanding of a new word by drawing a picture, pictograph, or symbol. When students do this step well, achievement increases.
- Games can engage students at a high level and can have a powerful effect on students' recall of new words. Games not only add some fun to the teaching and learning process, but also provide an opportunity to review the terms in a nonthreatening way.
